

Brady Sambrano, Advisor, Government, Economics, & Spanish:

Deeper Learning reminds educators what learning can—and should—be. The conference provided new ideas for increasing hands-on learning that requires critical thinking through the workshops we attended. Beyond that, Deeper Learning enabled staff at Incline to learn from educators around the world about new ideas and strategies that can be implemented within our school. Most importantly, Deeper Learning serves as an inspiration for what is possible at our school. Nationally—and globally—there are amazing things happening in education. The conference allowed us to see beyond our district what our school can be for our students. I'm excited to implement some of the ideas I learned into my classes in the coming months.

My experience at the Deeper Learning Conference helped me explore innovative assessment methods that measure critical thinking, collaboration, and problem-solving skills. I also gained insights into using technology for efficient and effective assessments, as well as ensuring that assessments are fair and equitable for all students. The conference also offered the unique advantage of connecting with like-minded professionals who share my passion for leveraging best practices in enriching our students' educational journey, facilitating

meaningful change in our school's approach to evaluating student growth, and preparing our students for future success.

I had a great time in the Deep Learning San Diego Conference. I appreciate the opportunity to collaborate, learn and dialogue with educators from all around the world while creating stronger professional relationships with my Incline High colleagues thanks to coffee, conversations, meals, walks and music. It motivates me to make sure my students become active participants in their learning, that their learning becomes actions, plans, projects where their doing can be reflected and promote positive changes for all.

It is encouraging to hear from educators everywhere that the challenges, although difficult, can be overcome. That the bear of the balance can change if we take risks and are not afraid of the new things we can discover.

Deirdre Carney, LTI Coordinator (Learning Through Interests/Internships):

The Deeper Learning Conference was a great experience. Choosing sessions to attend was a challenge as there were such a variety of topics to choose from. I chose a "Deep Dive" into recording arts and was fortunate to be joined by Ms. Foehl. This session was impactful in both how it set participants up for success and created space for sharing student voice and inclusion. The simple act of sharing perspectives through verse and then recording the results was engaging and powerful. Another great way to invite students to create their own art and authentic experiences! I am looking forward to adding this to the school's current podcasting setup and/or looking for ways to share other opportunities in classes/clubs or other venues that students might like to explore!

I was also struck by the incredible amount of learning experiences every single day. These included listening to students share their own learning at "student pop ups", participating in rich discussion in workshops, and sharing/reflecting with fellow Incline teammates 24/7! The power of experiencing collaborative learning and imagining how to infuse that work in our own sites is inspiring.

I am further inspired by experiencing the 6 Deeper Learning Competencies throughout workshops, discussions, and exhibitions. Using this framework was a powerful tool to examine my own learning experiences and imagine how it could be useful with our students:

DEEPER LEARNING COMPETENCIES



CRITICAL THINKING & PROBLEM SOLVING

Students consider a variety of innovative approaches to address and understand complex questions that are authentic and important to their communities.



CONTENT EXPERTISE

Students develop key competencies, skills, and dispositions with ample opportunities to apply knowledge and engage in work that matters to them.



EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION

Students practice listening to understand, communicating with empathy, and share their learning through exhibiting, presenting and reflecting on their work



COLLABORATION

Students co-design projects with peers, exercise shared-decision making, strengthen relational agency, resolve conflict, and assume leadership roles.



SELF DIRECTED LEARNING

Students use teacher and peer feedback and self-reflection to monitor and direct their own learning while building self knowledge both in and out of the classroom.



ACADEMIC MINDSET

Students establish a sense of place, identity, and belonging to increase self-efficacy while engaging in critical reflection and action.

Overall, this conference was a terrific opportunity, and I am grateful for the experience to share this with such a dedicated group of Incline educators.

Paul Nolan, Advisor, Freshmen & Junior English:

I was fortunate enough to be able to attend the Deeper Learning Conference in San Diego last week. What a great time and a fun and meaningful conference. The conference was at High Tech High School in San Diego. I attended sessions on engaging students' subconscious, project-based learning, and using challenging topics to promote deeper inquiry on student assignments. My "Deep Dive" day focused on student interviews in advisory class to find out students' true interests. That information can then be used to promote student engagement with school and ideas for their futures. I can't wait to start interviewing students after April Break and see where the interviews lead us! In addition to the conference sessions, we were treated to inspiring and interesting guest speakers who are innovative educators who had great stories to share. I enjoyed connecting with colleagues from IHS and around the country. It was a great time to recharge and get ready for the final quarter of this year and to think about next year. We had a meaningful and inspiring conference!

Danielle Jackson (DJ), Advisor, Special Education Department Leader:

My experience at the Deeper Learning 2023 Conference in San Diego, CA was rejuvenating, motivating, super fun, and focused on community building. I absolutely loved traveling, learning, bonding and being vulnerable with my

colleagues. Being at Deeper Learning and surrounded by like-minded, passionate individuals was like a breath of fresh air. I am so grateful to have had this opportunity!

The Deep Dive and Workshops I attended at Deeper Learning were centered around Restorative Justice, amplifying students' voices, and cultivating relationships and building community through restoration. This work celebrates student agency and is messy sometimes. If we're not getting messy, we're doing it wrong. We as educators need to be willing to start failing forward instead of standing still with our students. Let's take the risk and try it! Students need to be given power; we need to give them opportunities to be held accountable. Restoration must begin with the adults; we need to ensure we are holding ourselves accountable as well. Students need to be met where they're at in order to restore what has been broken or harmed. If we are able to restore relationships with students and adapt our approach to building school culture, it will increase student capacity, decrease behavior issues, and inspire students to develop an appetite for excellence.

The Cultivating Relationships Through Restoration Workshop I attended at Deeper Learning was centered around the importance of effective communication and healthy relationship skills. What is causing the behavior can help us understand students and meet them where they're at. Students want to be heard and seen, but if there is no one there to listen there is no student voice or investment. This is why communication and relationships are so important. Listening goes a long way. Our positions of authority as educators should be relational, not threatening. Mistakes should be talked about, not punished. The three R's in RJE are relate, repair, and restore. With the RJE approach to teaching and culture (mindset) building, students will win in life holistically because we invested in them. Building a healthy culture (mindset) within a school closes the gap between what we say and how we behave. Culture happens by design or default; we should design with intentionality. Every school is a work in progress, all we need is willingness to learn and relationship skills.

Another impactful Workshop I attended at Deeper Learning was Amplify Student Voices: Building Confident Communicators. This was a super fun experience where all attendees were vulnerable and stepped outside their comfort zone. It was a good reminder of what our students go through when we ask them to speak in front of their peers in the classroom. Through engaging techniques and activities like storytelling, debates, and one word quote circles, I gained a new perspective on how to effectively amplify and encourage student voice in my classroom. The equity of the environment is an essential component to amplify student voice and to build confident communicators. Facilitating an equitable

environment reduces predictability of success or failure, disrupts inequitable power dynamics, and promotes shared power, maximizes opportunity to showcase strengths and interests, and minimizes the impact of oppression. Expression is a core piece of learning. This multi-layered teaching approach is referred to as "Expression-Driven Teaching." I honestly can't wait to try some of these activities with my students.

There were many impactful speakers, powerful experiences, and connections and memories made during Deeper Learning 2023, but my biggest take-away is that I need to focus on my WHY and intention versus attention. I believe we need to be intentional about what we are communicating and teaching to our young people. We need to teach students to build community, have capacity, voice, expression, and agency as well as academic skills. Having positive culture and relationships among staff and students is essential if we are to create an environment where we can invest in our students intentionally and holistically so they can develop an appetite for excellence and win at life.

Tierney Cahill: Sophomore English, Principal:

Having time with staff to explore what school could be is a tremendous gift. Educators show up daily planning to engage, inspire, and offer opportunity to their scholars. Incline High School has some very talented and dedicated educators that are truly invested in the success of their students. It is, however, important to leave the village now and then to seek out current best practices in the field.

For example, if someone I cared about needed surgery, I would expect the surgeon conducting the surgery to be current in her/his training. I would expect them to know the most relevant and modern best practices to provide my loved one with the best possible outcome. I believe educators need similar opportunities to seek out what works in education and how to deeply engage, inspire and challenge our scholars for the modern world.


I attended many Den Talks conducted by nationally recognized school leaders sharing their wisdom: Ron Berger, EL Education; Dr. Kaleb Rashad, Creative Director HTH; Dr. Eric Chagala, Principal Vista Innovation & Design Academy 6-8; Manasa Yeturu, Stanford Business Graduate School Design Lecturer d.school; Dr. Andre Spicer, Superintendent South Region Los Angeles Unified; and Dr. Rochelle Gutierrez, Mathematics College of Education University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

My Deep Dive session was led by two school leaders from Eden Prairie HS in Eden Prairie, Minnesota. Eden Prairie was named a Blue Ribbon School of Excellence.


Their session shared how they used a platform called Brightidea to drive Student Voice. Staff and students are posed with a question related to an identified problem or an open call for innovative ideas, participants are able to submit their own ideas and solutions, comment on the input of others, and ultimately prioritize the best ideas by voting. The inclusive and collaborative nature of the platform creates space for knowledge sharing and creative problem solving and welcomes diverse perspectives and experiences of all participants.

Why crowd sourcing? Crowdsourcing is not the same as taking a survey. Crowdsourcing is a social experience that allows participants to share their ideas and perspectives through a transparent and open process. Crowdsourcing is powered by "divergent thinking", a way to source creative solutions by inviting a diverse set of voices and encouraging iterative, "out of the box" thinking.

Quick wins will emerge and these can be acted upon quickly. Many top ideas may need further work which then launches a series of design workshops (based on human-centered design and design thinking methods) with the goal of creating prototypes for top ideas.



The innovation pipeline can provide structure to the testing, iterating and scaling of ideas. Transparency in the process creates a positive feedback loop and continuation of participation in future innovative initiatives.



Another platform I'm very interested in is Inkwire. Inkwire is a student portfolio builder that helps learners to curate their work for specific audiences and milestones in their academic journeys. It allows students to demonstrate learning in a variety of ways – audio, video, links, documents – and have it displayed in beautiful gallery format to encourage sharing and feedback. Everything a learner uploads into their digital binder, which is then accessible and easy – to – search at any time. Inkwire is currently used by Santa Monica Malibu USD, High Tech High, Sedona Public Schools, and Oakland USD.

Student voice is very important to a responsive school. Students should be involved in how their school operates to ensure it meets their needs. Incline HS has had senior Ivy Batmale serve as a student voice ambassador to the school district. This year she's the student representative on the Board of Trustees. Ivy attended the Big Picture Learning Conference with staff last summer in Miami. Ivy will be going away to college next year, so it's time to start a Highlander Voice team for students interested in serving on a team to assist in implementing student ideas.

This summer I'd like to invite students interested in serving on Highlander Voice, to apply to attend the Big Picture Learning Conference in Kansas City July 24th – 27th. If your scholar is interested in attending, please have them write an essay on why they would like to attend and how they will serve their peers next year on the Highlander Voice team. 


