

Congratulations Incline High School – AP School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering wide-reaching results for their students. Incline HS = GOLD with Access

The AP School Honor Roll, which replaces the previous AP District Honor Roll, offers schools recognition across four levels of distinction: Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum. Schools on the AP School Honor Roll may also earn the AP Access Award, honoring schools that demonstrate a clear and effective commitment to equitable access to advanced coursework. For a school to be recognized on the AP School Honor Roll, it must be located within the United States (including U.S. territories) or Canada and:

• Meet each of the following criteria anchored in research-based relationships between AP and college outcomes:

• College Culture: 40% or more of graduating cohort took at least 1 AP Exam during high school.



• **College Credit**: 25% or more of the graduating cohort scored a 3 or higher on at least 1 AP Exam during high school.

• College Optimization: 2% or more of the graduating cohort took 5 or more AP Exams during high school. At least 1 of those exams was taken in 9th or 10th grade, so that students are spreading their AP experience across grades rather than feeling disproportionate pressure in any single year.

• Have full-time grade-12 enrollments.

Schools can earn the additional AP Access Award if the percentage of AP Exam takers who are underrepresented minority and/or low-income students mirrors the school's overall student demographics.

### As of October 2023

Of the 15,150 eligible schools, 4,570 schools (30%) earned a place on the 2023 AP School Honor Roll.<sup>1</sup>

In addition, **39%** of schools on the Honor Roll earned the **AP Access Award**.

**PSAT Scores** are available through your student's account. Semi-Finalists will be announced in September of 2024. If you feel you're a contender for the scholarship, it's advised to practice for the

SATs because it's required to confirm the PSAT scores. Great job to everyone that signed up for the PSATs.

**2024-25 Course Selection** for 10<sup>th</sup> – 11<sup>th</sup> grades will take place before winter break. Be looking for emails from your counselor with course selection information. 9<sup>th</sup> graders will go through this process after winter break.

### Grade Level Planning Calendars

**Seniors** need to confirm with your counselor that your T2 course selection puts you in the best possible position for transitioning well into your post-secondary choices. Seniors, if you haven't yet finalized your post-secondary plans, you should book an appointment with Ms. Carney in the library.

You should be collecting your letters of recommendations and copies of your transcripts to submit for applications for scholarships! Please keep checking the scholarships section of the website for updates/information as needed. Also, do not forget to check with the financial aid offices at the colleges you are applying to (both in state AND out of state) for information on scholarship opportunities they have as well. Don't miss out on the opportunity to receive any additional merit-based scholarships! For UNR: February 1st is the admission deadline for scholarship consideration! **Need a transcript**? All transcripts must be ordered through: <a href="https://washoeschoolsnv.scriborder.com">https://washoeschoolsnv.scriborder.com</a> The school is not allowed to give unofficial OR official transcripts to students. You must order through this website, and your first (4) transcripts are free. You have the option of mailing a sealed transcript or having an electronic version emailed to you (or the destination of your choice). Please remember to allow for processing and plan accordingly!

Already been accepted to your college of choice? Congratulations! Make sure you review your student account with the school. Many will be requesting your shot records, opening their in-house scholarships, asking for applications to be filled out for housing, and requesting transcripts. If you are in the Jump Start Program taking college classes and/or have passed AP tests with a score of 3, 4, or 5, remember to submit your AP test scores, as well as your transcripts from TMCC or other community colleges you have attended. Schools will need this information to waive classes and give you college credits (if applicable)!

**GOING TO COLLEGE OUT OF STATE?** Applications are open, so start applying and meet those priority deadlines! Meeting those deadlines is highly encouraged because you will receive your acceptance letters first, financial aid packages, it helps with merit scholarships they offer, and much more. Make sure you are talking with admission counselors and representatives to understand deadlines, housing requirements and necessary documents needed for admissions. ALL SCHOOLS ARE DIFFERENT! So please do your research.

**UC/CSU**: These applications are OPEN. The deadline to apply for both systems is typically November 30th.

**FAFSA UPDATES**: If you are a senior (or parent of a senior!) and wish to apply for financial aid for college (community colleges and 4-year colleges, as well many technical/vocational colleges), you MUST complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA has been revamped and will not be available until December 2023. WCSD is hosting several FAFSA Nights at each of the high schools in January and February 2024 to assist students and parents with this application process! Please check the College & Career Center website for those dates and for more detailed information on the financial aid process! Information regarding financial aid, scholarships, upcoming events, career exploration tools, college search resources, and much more are posted on our Counseling website. As a parent, you can access all this information on the Counseling website anytime! COLLEGE & CAREER CENTER EVENTS: PLEASE CHECK WEBSITE AS ADDITIONS AND CHANGES MAY HAPPEN AT ANY TIME!

As always, please continue to check the bulletin boards (located outside of the College & Career Center, the Library, and the Counseling Office) and the College & Career Center website for upcoming college visits, scholarships, and events. Scholarships (and college admission visits and other events) are being added daily, so please keep checking and applying for those scholarships! **November** 

- Complete and submit all applications. If not applying online, be sure to mail on time. Do not forget the application fee!
- □ UC/CSU application deadline is November 30th!
- Apply for student housing (if planning to live on-campus) as soon as the university/college will allow!
- If attending a community college (like TMCC), now is the time to start the application process: 1) apply online; 2) take required placement tests (e.g. the Accuplacer); 3) attend a new student orientation and academic advisement workshop; 4) register for classes; 5) pay for classes. Also review financial aid and scholarship opportunities at the community college through their financial aid office. Get your FSA ID (https://studentaid.gov/fsa-id/create-account/launch) so you and your parent can start your FAFSA application when it becomes available in December! The FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and is required to apply for financial aid (grants, loans, etc.) from the federal government. Many colleges/universities also use the FAFSA to determine financial aid awards.
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- December
- January 1st is the typical deadline for application to some selective colleges (others have deadlines later in January or February).
- Review the following with your parent to help you prepare for completing the FAFSA: <u>https://studentaid.gov/apply-for-aid/fafsa/filling-out</u>. Start to gather your and your parent(s) financial/tax records!
- Contact the financial aid office at each college to see if there are any additional financial aid forms required in addition to the FAFSA (e.g. the Profile). Do NOT wait until you find out if you have

been accepted to apply for financial aid! You will need to submit all required financial aid forms even if you have not been notified of your acceptance to the college(s) to which you applied.

- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- January
- Submit the FAFSA online as soon as possible (<u>https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa</u>). Attend any of the WCSD FAFSA Nights in January/February for assistance! Check with all financial aid offices about any other financial aid options and when to file other required financial aid applications or forms.
- □ Apply for our local Incline Scholarships
- Request that your official high school transcript be sent to colleges applied too (if requested): <u>https://washoeschoolsnv.scriborder.com/</u>
- □ Contact the admissions office of the college(s) to which you have applied to make sure your application has been received and that they have all the required forms and paperwork.
- Males between the ages of 18-25 years old must register with the Selective Service (<u>https://www.sss.gov/register/who-needs-to-register/</u>)
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- February
- If you filed your FAFSA online, you should receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) via email within 3-5 days. If corrections are needed, correct, and return it to the FAFSA processor promptly.
- □ Contact the financial aid office of the college(s) to which you applied to make sure your information has been received and they have all the required paperwork they need.
- If you have not received an acceptance notification from any college to which you applied, contact the admissions office to find out the status of your application and the notification period for acceptances/denials.
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- □ March/April
- Look for admission notifications via mail or email
- Carefully review and compare financial aid award packages (and scholarship offers) from colleges. Call, email or write to the college financial aid office if you have any questions. Do not just look at how much aid you are offered- review how much of your need is covered, and the type of aid and repayment terms (if applicable). If you do not receive any (or enough) financial aid, ask about any other financing options.
- If you are accepted by more than one college, decide which one is best for you- you may be required to send a non-refundable deposit! May 1st is typically the deadline for the Statement of Intent to Register. Notify all other colleges of your decision- be fair to the colleges and to other students who may be on their wait list.
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- May

- □ If "wait listed" by your first-choice college, call, visit or write to the admissions director to state your intention and ask how to strengthen your application. If you need financial aid to attend that "wait list" college, find out if funds will be available if you are accepted.
- Send the required deposit to the college of your choice. If you have been offered financial aid from the college you selected, make sure you accept the offer as instructed by your award letter. Finalize all elements of your financial aid package (e.g., loan applications, etc.) Find out the amount and the "due dates" for tuition and room/board fees. Contact the financial aid office if you have any questions!
- □ Find out from the college what else you must do, if anything, to establish and maintain your financial aid eligibility.
- If you have received financial aid from other colleges, make sure you let them know you will not be attending. And remember, you must reapply for financial aid every year.
- Take AP exams if applicable (remember to research the AP credit policy at your selected college for passing AP scores!)
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!
- □ June/Summer
- Remember to request your final official high school transcript be sent to your college: <u>https://washoeschoolsnv.scriborder.com/</u>
- Evaluate whether your family's health insurance coverage is sufficient for your needs while you are attending college. Determine if you need to research student health insurance.
- Participate in any summer orientation programs for incoming freshman
- □ Continue researching and applying for scholarships!!

**Juniors** should be studying for the upcoming ACT in February. We have a free course available to help prepare you through Edgenuity. If you'd like access to this, please email Ms. Lombardi at: <u>ALombardi@washoeschools.net</u> and she'll add you to the course.

### October/November

DContinue working hard in your classes and get good grades!

DAttend the district college fair to assist in the college selection process. Talk to college representatives, adults and college students about their college experiences for tips and advice. Begin narrowing down your college choices.

DKeep parents informed on colleges you are considering- examine financial resources and gather information about financial aid. Discuss with your parent(s) financial aid options!

If interested in a military academy, talk to your counselor about starting the application process now. See the local academy representative as there are several early deadlines plus the requirement of congressional recommendations.

#### December/January

DReview your PSAT scores with your counselor. Determine areas to improve upon for the SAT and ACT. Remember: SAT/ACT scores are typically used for admission purposes, scholarship applications, NCAA initial eligibility, and placement in English and Math classes at college.

DRegister for spring (May/June) SAT/ACT and Subject exams (if required) at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u> and <u>www.actstudent.org</u>. Try both exams! Almost all colleges will accept your best score(s) on either exam. Remember: You cannot take the SAT and the Subject Exam(s) on the same test date! Plan accordingly.

EStart preparing for SAT/ACT exams. Free study aids are available online at the SAT and ACT websites, Khan Academy, and at the Library/College and Career Center.

DReview your transcript with your counselor; refine your college list and review those you are interested in and your chances of acceptance.

### February/March

□If possible, schedule campus visits now for the spring term when colleges are still in session □Plan for challenging and rigorous courses your senior year (Honors/AP). Do not "take a break"-plan on taking a full schedule your senior year. Colleges look for rigor all 4 years of high school! □Continue to review your progress towards meeting NCAA eligibility requirements

(www.eligibilitycenter.org) for college athletics. Plan your senior year courses accordingly! IContinue researching college costs and the process of applying for financial aid. Attend a college financial aid information session.

DInvestigate scholarship opportunities- utilize online scholarship search resources and websites (see your counselor/Counseling Center for details)

DResearch interesting and challenging summer courses, jobs, and activities (check for summer programs on college campuses)

### April/May

DNarrow college choices to five to eight schools

DTake the SAT/ACT and Subject exams (if applicable)

DTake AP exams in May

DResearch volunteer, employment and/or internship opportunities this summer to enhance your college application. Stay involved with extracurricular activities-- colleges look for consistency and depth in activities (quality vs. quantity).

DArrange college visits and interviews for summer. Arrange tours, meet with admission counselors, and possibly stay overnight in a dorm! Review college websites for admission requirements and application deadlines.

DReview your transcript: Make sure everything is correct and no errors!

#### Summer

DReview and register for Fall SAT/ACT test dates. Students typically improve their scores on the second attempt.

Elf planning on Division I, II, or III college athletics: Register with the NCAA online at:

www.eligibilitycenter.org. Early registration helps student athletes avoid pitfalls that could delay your academic or amateur certification.

DGet involved in an internship or job related to your career interests and/or volunteer and community service activities.

DVisit the campuses of your top college choices. Keep your college options open and consider all possibilities. In addition to your "reach" and "mid-range" schools, keep some "safety" schools on your list.

DCompose rough drafts of your college essays (if required). Review with a teacher and prepare final drafts. Proofread, proofread, proofread!

DConsider a summer job and save your money to help pay for college costs. Develop a financial aid application plan (include list of aid sources, requirements for applications, and timetable to meet filing deadlines)

# Sophomores:

DReview your progress on meeting graduation and college admission requirements. Study hard and keep your grades up!

DContinue to take challenging courses (Honors/AP)- colleges look for rigor- and get involved in extracurricular, volunteer and community service activities that are meaningful to YOU. Work toward leadership positions in activities you like best.

DVisit the College and Career Center to find information about colleges, careers, and scholarship planning. Review catalogs, computerized college-search programs, and college guides such as Big Future on https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/college-search

□Start collecting college info and data such as possible majors, size, location, costs, etc. Use college websites to start exploring! Look for "Prospective Students" or "Future Students" on college websites as a starting point. Research admission requirements, application procedures, costs, majors, virtual tours, etc.

□If interested in a military academy (e.g. West Point or Annapolis), now is the time to start planning and getting information on the application process. □Start collecting info about other educational/technical programs or the military if not planning to attend a college or university □Keep putting money aside for college- continue talking with parents about financing post high school goals.

DStart your personal and academic resume for college applications and letters of recommendation (include GPA, volunteer work/community service, employment, leadership and all extracurricular activities and hobbies).

DRead, read, read and work on your writing skills! You will need strong reading and writing skills no matter what you do in your future.

DTake the PSAT (Practice SAT) and review your results in December or January with your counselor. Although the PSAT is "practice", take advantage of reviewing the test booklet and practice test beforehand!

DIf a potential college requires Subject Tests, ask your counselor about taking them this year. It is a good idea to take Subject tests just after you finish your last course in that subject area (e.g. the sciences and history).

DMemorize your social security number- if you don't have one, get one. You'll need it to take admission tests and apply for college, financial aid, and jobs.

□Review NCAA eligibility requirements online at www.eligibilitycenter.org. Check all requirements (including approved Galena High School coursework) to make sure you are on track! □Considering including college campus visits during family trips over summer or breaks


